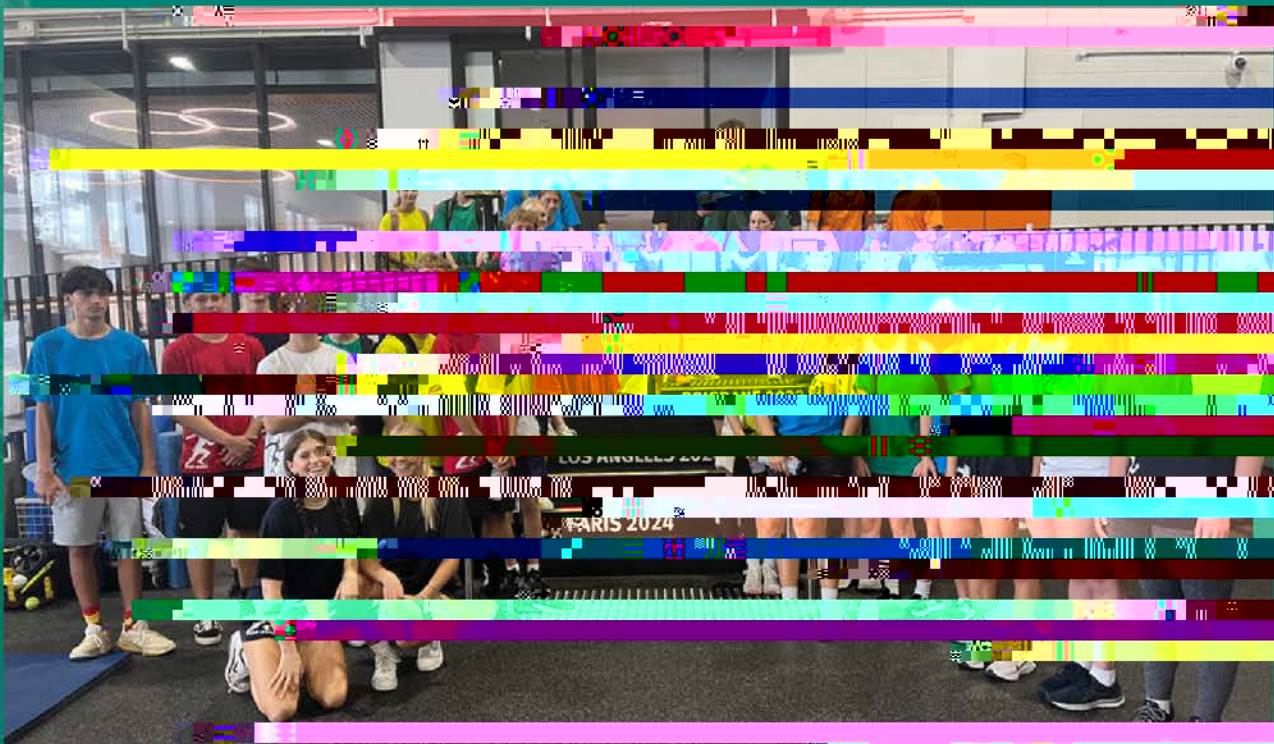


UQ Youth Game Changers



EVENT REPORT

Summary

In 2023, the Queensland Centre for Olympic and Paralympic Studies at the University of Queensland hosted the inaugural **UQ Leadership Program**. This program was developed in collaboration with Flinders Discovery Institute at Matthew Flinders Anglican College, and the Queensland Academy of Sport, the program is created to establish Queensland students in leadership and to lead the legacies of the 2032 Brisbane Olympic and Paralympic Games.

What were the aims of the UQ Youth Summit Challenge?

Build Leaders

- Understand Olympic and Paralympic Legacies and the proposed initiatives of the 2032 Olympic and Paralympic games
- Learn about the diverse people and cultures and people who will impact and be impacted by the 2032 Olympic and Paralympic games
- Explore the processes, policies and projects that bring about change, within cultures, communities, and organisations.
- Learn about factors influencing high performance sport.

Develop Leaders

- Harness personal and team personal strengths to meet a challenge.
- Identify the unique strengths and strategies.
- Build own and team problem solving and design thinking effective strategies.

Foster

- Proactively connect with other participants, staff, and presenters on their life journeys.
- Connect with leaders in research, policy, business, and sport.
- Work with students from diverse schools and backgrounds.

Promote and Inspire

- Have fun - be young!
- Discover what it feels like to be a tertiary student, life on campus and in a residential college.
- Share thoughts, ideas, and perspectives - they are valuable and offer a significant source of youth voice.

What did the students do at UQ Youth Game Changers?

Working in teams of 8 students with 1 UQ undergraduate mentor, UQ Youth Game Changers participants will be challenged to demonstrate their leadership, engagement and leadership of the 2032 Brisbane Legacy initiatives. In this process or response to this challenge, participants will explore the following questions:

- How can young people be inspired to drive and support the 2032 Olympic and Paralympic Legacy?
- How can young people engage with research to bring about “glocal” change in their communities?
- What can young people learn from past Olympians and current researchers and innovators to inform their contributions to and leadership of a 2032 Brisbane Olympic Legacy?
- What skills do young people need to enact leadership and advocate for the change that underpins an Olympic Legacy?

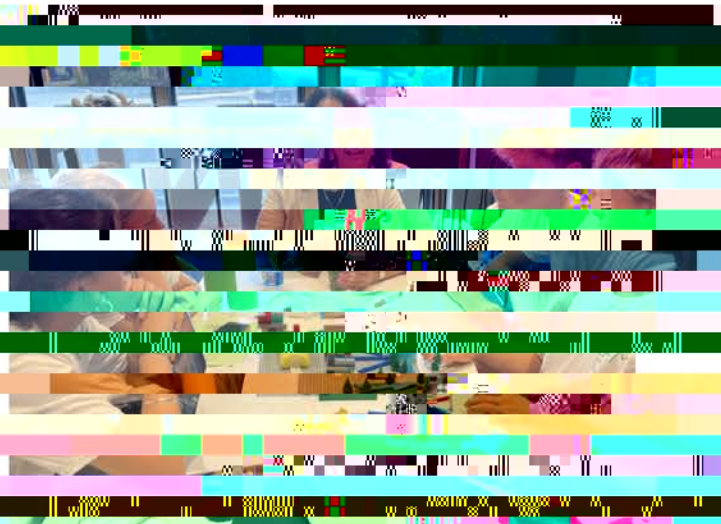
The UQ Youth Game Changers Challenge

The 2024 UQ Youth Game Changers Challenge is a competition for UQ students with their team members and guest participants to create a strategy that responds to the following overarching aspiration:

How can we promote young people's engagement with research and leadership of the 2032 Games Legacy initiatives?

On Friday 12th October, UQ Youth Game Changers teams engaged in a pitch competition at UQ and UQ ventures co-venue to devise a pitch to UQ stakeholders. The judges awarded the winning prize to the pitch according to the three criteria:

- 1. Originality**
 - Is this a novel solution that's fit for purpose?
 - Does the solution use any innovative ideas?
 - Are the needs, interests and aspirations of young people a strong focus?
- 2. Feasibility**
 - Is the idea able to be created within a reasonable budget and timeframe?
 - Does the idea have a realistic business model?
- 3. Effectiveness of the presentation**
 - Is the presentation compelling and engaging?
 - Would the presentation attract potential investors/buyers and users?

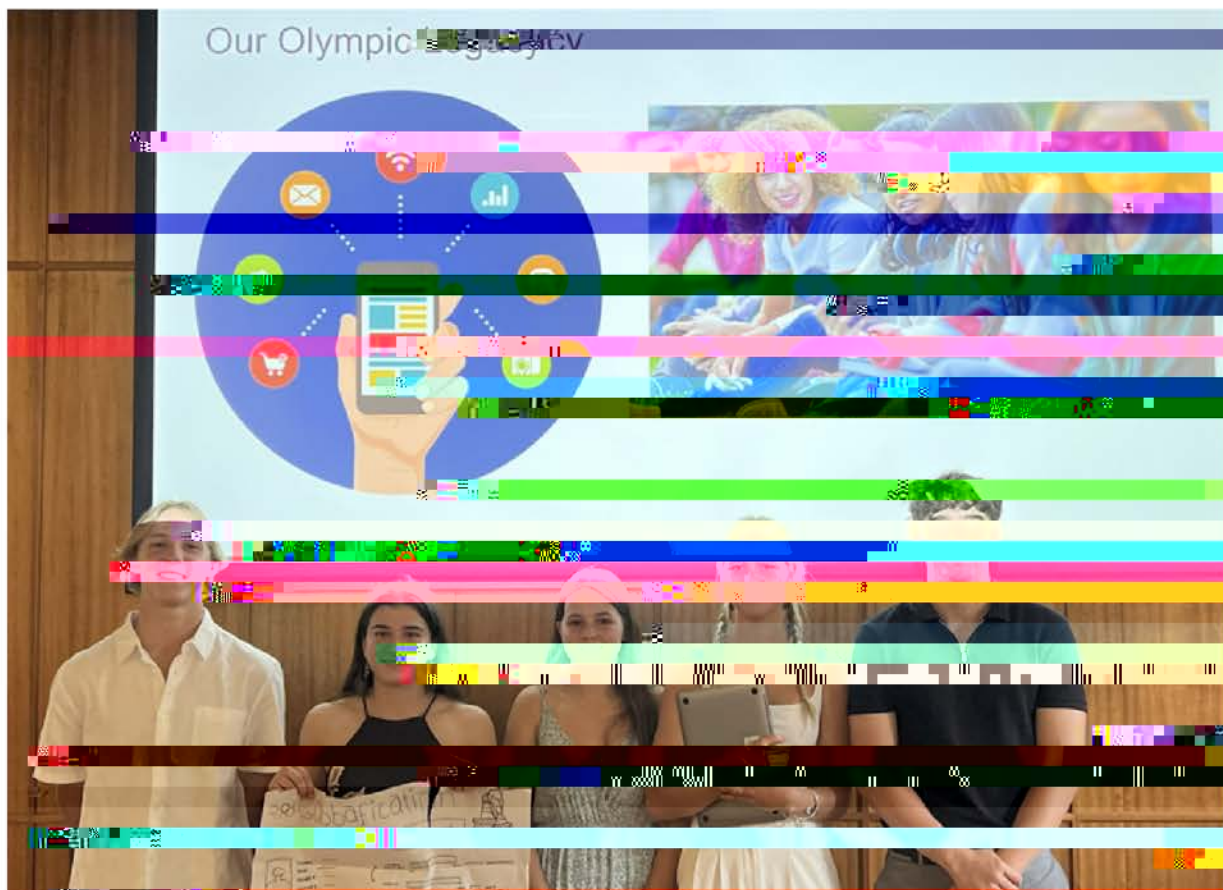


The Winning Pitch

Team #6 successfully pitched their project "Gabbirication" to engage young people in the Games Legacy. This strategy involves creating a gaming app that allows young people to spread awareness on the impacts of carbon emissions on our health and in turn, our performance as athletes.

This app allows everyone to play as your own (personalised) Olympic athlete avatar and allows you to travel as your olympic athlete and have all the responsibilities as a participating athlete; such as - travelling to your events, competing in events and choosing the most sustainable way-of-living. In the game you start at the Olympic village and progress through stages represented by different sporting events.

The aim of the game is to be achieved through playings in your sporting events and you can upgrade, purchase gadgets, and even new characters. All processes are funded to create a more sustainable Brisbane by planting trees to create a greener future for not only us but our

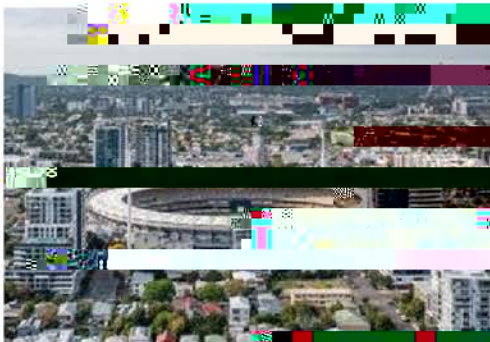
